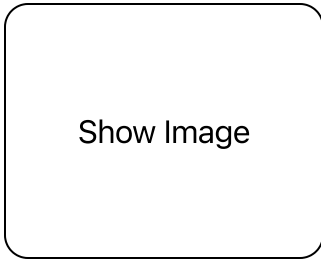


THE EMISSARY

SYNOPSIS
